# Application for Department of Interior 105(l) Program

Section 105(l) of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (ISDEAA) provides funding for Tribes and Tribal Organizations that carry out Federal functions under the self-determination contract and self-governance compact. This program's funding is considered mandatory funding which will allow Delaware Nation to renew these leases year after year.

Delaware Nation has been working on two facility cost agreements for several months and has hopes of signing the leases in June 2024. The amount of the lease is based on fair market rental or cost elements. Delaware Nation appreciates the assistance of Bryan Shade, Delaware Nation attorney, who has taken the lead in this effort. The Delaware Nation staff who have also participated in this effort include Kyle Dover, CPA; Kandess Botone, Facilities Director; Josh Farley, IT Director; Janice Maddox, Tribal Administrator and the Executive Committee members.

#### Beaded Earrings and Necklace Classes May 14 & 15 (and May 29), 2024

This class consisted of participants learning how to make a seed bead earring and necklace set. Instructor was William M. Tosee, Sr.

Each participant was provided their choice of colors on seed beads, with usually a five-color combination, one color being a primary or "background" color for a lack of a better description, the rest of the color combinations; with either each color separated with a silver bead in between each color or some chose to place the color combination in a gradient formation then separated each section with silver beads. Some participants were able to finish a five-strand necklace and some finished with a three-strand necklace, depending on their own pace of work and design. Resulting with an always impressive but unique layout of beads from each individual participant. It is always so rewarding to see how every individual person can come up with a totally different design, with the supply of beads that were provided. Simply beautiful, this contemporary style compliments, any type of clothing style to modern-day casual fashion to the Native American-look to either traditional regalia to modern contemporary blouse and ribbon skirt attire.

(This class was scheduled for May 14 & 15, but needed one more class session (May 29) to allow all class participants to finish their earring and necklace set, and to complete the class and leave with a beautiful finished set.)

- This grant funded program provides Delaware Nation households a 36-month membership with Telemedicine.com
- The Telemedicine.com membership allows healthcare providers to connect with patients from a distance, eliminating the need for inperson visits for a variety of illnesses and conditions
- The Telemedicine.com membership covers all members of your household, including nonnative family members
- The Telemedicine.com membership also provides a health kit to assist with your virtual visits
- The health kit includes a Wi-Fi enabled tablet device, Wi-Fi enabled Medical Device Gateway, blue-tooth enabled weight scale, blood pressure arm monitor, pulse oximeter, glucometer, thermometer, and for households with children, a digital otoscope (to examine ears). The kit will be provided with a custom storage case to minimize damage to devices.

# Tips for Staying Mentally & Physically Healthy this Summer

Mental health and physical health are largely connected, so by taking care of your body, you're also taking care of your mind. Here are five things to remember this summer to help you take care of your body and mind.

#### 1. Get your rest

Routines may vary with summer events but aim to get seven to nine hours of sleep a night. Keep your room cool and shades pulled to help make your sleep more comfortable.

#### 2. Move your body

Added heat (even if it's dry heat!) can make exercise uncomfortable in the summer months. Try getting some exercise in the morning hours before the sun is at its peak. Or break up your day and go for shorter walk breaks throughout your day.

#### 3. Connect with others

Plan something fun with family or friends. It doesn't need to be expensive, but being social and around others will help keep any negative thoughts from ruminating. If you aren't feeling like being in a crowded space (street fair, farmers' market, amusement park), try to call at least one person to stay connected.

#### 4. Stay hydrated

Aim to drink more than the standard eight glasses a day. And get creative: put some frozen berries in your water or even some mint leaves and lime slices. Opt for snacks with high-water content such as watermelon, cantaloupe, tomatoes, and cucumbers.

#### 5. Wear sunscreen

Look for at least an SPF 30 and wear it all the time! Even if you are just running errands or going for a "short walk," ultraviolet exposure increases somewhere between four and 10 percent for every 1,000 feet above sea level. So at an altitude of 9,000 feet (about equal to Georgetown), UV radiation can be nearly 50 percent more intense than at sea level.

Use these tips to help take care of yourself this summer and stay safe and healthy all season long!

- Is there a minimum number of months I need to sign up for in order to start
   Telemedicine.com service? No, Delaware Nation has covered all costs associated for a 12-month period.
- 2. I signed up but I don't have my confirmation email yet. Receiving a confirmation email can take up to 30-45 minutes. Please check your junk mail folder to ensure you received it. The confirmation email will say "New Benefit Announcement" in the subject line. If you still haven't received an email confirmation, please call us at (888) 676-0332 or email us at mail@telemedicine.com
- 3. What conditions can I get treatment for? We treat most non-emergency medical conditions, as well as mental health. See the full list of conditions above.
- 4. Is there a CoPay? No, the monthly subscription fee paid by Delaware Nation covers all costs to visit with a doctor online.
- 5. Can I use my insurance? We do not take insurance, however, there are no hidden fees. Your monthly subscription paid by Delaware Nation allows you to see a doctor 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days per year.
- 6. I want to see a mental health therapist. Will I get a different therapist each time I request a mental health consultation? The way our program works is that we treat episodic issues. You would most likely not get the same therapist each time as we have a multitude of providers.
- 7. Will my online doctor be able to order an x-ray? We are not able to order imaging. If you obtain imaging, our doctors may be able to review it.
- 8. Are there any medications that my online doctor can't prescribe? We are not able to prescribe any controlled substances. See the controlled substance list here: https://www.deadiversion.usdoj.gov/schedules/orangebook/c\_cs\_alpha.pdf
- 9. Can my online doctor treat my infant? The minimum age to use our service is two (2).
  10. Can my dependent child attending college in another state still be on my account? Yes. You can keep your dependent children on your family plan until they reach the age of 26. However, when your child turns 18, they must manage their own account and will be prompted to do so.
- Please note that if your account (the primary account) is canceled, theirs will terminate as well.

  11. How do I cancel my membership? Please send an email to <a href="mail@telemedicine.com">mail@telemedicine.com</a>. The Delaware Nation Housing Department currently owns 10 homes and is in the process of buying additional homes. If you would like to apply for these homes and be placed on the waiting list, please call, email or stop by the housing office to get an application. We are excited to announce a new General Welfare Homeowner Assistance Fund (HAF) Program. This is a one-time application per household where we assist tribal citizens who own their home with mortgage payments and utility payments. Applications are on the Delaware Nation website.

We are currently accepting applications for the Emergency Repair Program. With our Emergency Repair Program, the housing foreman and the housing laborers were able to replace a water heater for an elder. Housing has also worked with Delaware Nation homeowners by teaching them how to make necessary repairs to maintain their homes.

The Housing Department has recently attended the SPONAP(Southern Plains Office of Native Americans Programs) Admission and Occupancy training where they discussed the overview of NAHASDA (Native American Housing Assistance and Self Determination Act of 1996), application process, wait list management, calculating adjusted gross income and lease agreements.

We also attended the Southern Plains Indian Housing Association (SPIHA) training where we discussed and learned policies and procedures as well as safety tips on how to protect yourself from intruders and fires.

# DELAWARE NATION BEGINS THE COMPREHENSIVE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STRATEGY (CEDS) PROCESS

Delaware Nation has begun working on a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy to develop a road map that will guide Delaware Nation (DN) in determining where to allocate resources and identify economic development priorities over a period of 5 years. This fact-based strategic economic development action plan will increase the Nation's long-term economic sustainability and competitiveness.

Delaware Nation's Executive Committee and the Steering Committee will work collaboratively with Martyna Triggs, Vice President for Capacity Group USA, during this project.

Delaware Nation Historical Preservation, Education and Cultural Preservation departments are currently working hand in hand with curriculum developers sponsored by the First American's Museum, to develop Delaware Nation owned and produced curriculum.


The First American's Museum has received a grant to help Tribal Nations develop authentic curriculum told in their words and not out of a diluted history book. This curriculum will be available to public and private school teachers on a portal created by the First American's Museum. Delaware Nation citizens will also have access to the curriculum to learn on their own or teach to their children.


The curriculum developers assigned by the First American Museum are veteran educators and curriculum developers who will pave the way for the Delaware Nation to continue to develop lesson plans for a wide range of topics regarding Delaware Nation history, culture, government and self-determination.

The first lesson will be on the Treaty of Fort Pitt of 1778. This treaty was the first ever to be signed between the Lenape people and the United States. This significant treaty is also the first to ever be signed by any Native American Tribe.

The ultimate goal of this project is to create age appropriate lesson plans for anyone to use. Each topic will be given great consideration and respect. The Executive Committee will approve all lesson plans before they are disseminated and Delaware Nation will place licensing restrictions as seen fit. The Delaware Nation is excited for this journey and the knowledge it will bring to tribal citizens everywhere.

#### **Lenapehoking Youth Program**

On November 27, 2023, Delaware Nation entered into a MOU with Stockbridge-Munsee Community to implement the National Fish and Wildlife Lenapehoking Grant. The purpose of this grant is to develop a Homeland's Fellowship in the Delaware River Valley. In the first phase of this grant, all three federally recognized Lenape Tribes will collaborative plan how to bring Lenape Tribal youth back to the Lenape ancestral lands.

Delaware staff, Jaclyn McCasland, EPA Director; Skylar Miller, EPA staff and Youth Coordinator; and Carissa Speck, Historic Preservation Director, are working with a small group of Delaware youth to fulfil the requirements in this first phase of the grant.

The first meeting of the Lenapehoking Youth Program was held on Thursday, May 30th. The following youth were in attendance: Serenitee McCasland, Ra'Kaya Givens, Brayden Lemos, Jaeden Spray-Hunter, Kayleigh Combs, Iliana Hernandez and Saniya Miller. All attendees had watched the movie, The Water Gap, prior to this meeting so a discussion could take place. Some of the activities seen in this movie that the participants thought were interesting and liked were archery, kayaking, soil testing, basket weaving, pottery and exploring the grounds where the ancestors had walked. Another discussion was held on the local plants in the area and how they were used (i.e., covering human scent when hunting, healing, etc.).

Since many did not know a lot about our history, they were introduced to our origin story and the Mesingw. Each participant will receive a copy of the Orange and Green Books. Each participant was encouraged to contact the Enrollment Department to retrieve their family tree to learn more about their lineage.

The Youth Program will be traveling to the Delaware Water Gap this July to connect with the other youth participants from the Stockbridge-Munsee Community and the Delaware Tribe of Indians to share culture and stories, interact with the homelands, forage for traditional plants and medicine, kayak and view Lenape artifacts. They are very excited to be traveling to Lenapehoking for the first time.



#### Native American Bone and Glass Bead Necklace Class, Part 1 & Part 2 April 9 and 16, 2024

Participants learned to make a bone and glass bead necklace (more of a "contemporary" three-row necklace). Instructor: William M. Tosee, Sr.

Participants were provided jewelry wire, jump rings, split rings, lobster clasps, bone beads and their choice of Czech 8mm glass bead colors from 2 to 5 color combination. Instructor Tosee had a pictures of examples of how a necklace of this design can be strung. The finished product being a three strand necklace approximately 26 inches in length, some were adjusted to individual preferred length. The participants were very involved and finished with the provided amount of time for this particular class. It is always a great feeling for all involved when everyone enjoys working and visiting, sharing ideas and stories. The participants each had their own personal layout of their necklaces and displayed their uniqueness in their own finished necklace, all being beautiful!

#### **Seton Hall NAGPRA Meeting**

On April 30, representatives from the Delaware Tribe of Indians Historic Preservation Department, Delaware Nation's THPO Katelyn Lucas, and myself visited Seton Hall University Museum of Anthropology and Archaeology in South Orange, New Jersey to look through their collections of artifacts and determine which might be associated with burials. Their collection was massive, and very impressive. There were artifacts that were very well preserved and rare. These artifacts came from sites excavated by Herbert Kraft, who spent his career researching Lenape people and culture. These sites range from New Jersey, Pennsylvania and New York. Based on this, we can consider these Lenape artifacts. Unfortunately, Seton Hall does have ancestors stored and we will be beginning NAGPRA consultation with them for the ancestors, and ongoing consultation for the artifacts. The collection was so great that we only had time to look through a portion of the artifacts, and we were there for 7 hours.

Jeremy Johnson and Martina Thomas, both Delaware Tribe of Indian citizens and representatives, visited the ancestors that were stored to place tobacco with them and to pray over them. It was a very long and exhaustive day, but the work needed to be done. We were glad to have been able to do this in person and now we know just how extensive this collection is and we are aware that repatriating everything from Seton Hall will takes years. This is just the beginning.

Another thing to add, is that Seton Hall has a very unique and another rare artifact named the Jennings Petroglyph. This is on display in their library. There is very little information but we do believe that it is likely Lenape and it may predate the woodland period. It was originally located on the New Jersey side of the Delaware River across from Dingmans Ferry in Pike County, Pennsylvania. The petroglyph was unearthed by Rudyard Jennings in 1965. It was donated to Seton Hall with the intention of protecting it from flooding caused by the proposed Tocks Island dam on the Delaware River site where the petroglyph was previously located. Ultimately, the dam was never built.

















#### **Department News & Services**

#### **Delaware Nation Environmental Programs (DNEP) News**

Garden update: On April 9, 2024, Langston University and OSU extension office came to help DNEP install plasticulture and irrigation in the garden. Delaware Nation is an OSU extension partner and plan to host some beginning farmer classes.

On April 21 and 22nd, Delaware Nation employees came to help plant 176 transplants of various fruits and veggies. Lenape Gardens acquired 5 bee hives of a hybrid species, Carniolan and Italian. Bees were sourced locally. If you would like to volunteer your time or would like to harvest fresh vegetables, please contact Delaware Nation Environmental Programs, Voc-Rehabilitation, or CHR. We are needing volunteers to help tend the garden, harvest, and create vegetable baskets for elders. Students in need of community service are extremely encouraged to volunteer. If you are an elder in need of fresh vegetables or would like to help in the garden, please contact Jaclyn McCasland, 405-247-2448x1173.

April 22, 2024-May 3, 2024, Delaware Nation Environmental Programs provided a roll-off for tribal citizen use for spring cleaning projects.

April 10, 2024, Delaware Nation Environmental Programs hosted a community Shred event. This event is open to the public and allows for a safe way to clean out old files and dispose of confidential information properly. The shredded paper is then recycled.

April 8-12, 2024, Delaware Nation Environmental Programs collected E-waste. This service allows for proper disposal of electronics and recycling of metals. Recycling the e-waste components helps with reducing the need for mining new materials and decreases what goes into the landfill.

April 16-17, 2024, Delaware Nation Environmental Program staff attended the Region 6, Regional Tribal Operation Committee meeting in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Tribes and Pueblos from New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, and Louisiana meet to discuss important environmental topics in Indian Country. Environmental Director, Jaclyn McCasland, gave the report out for National Tribal Water Council. Each of the 10 regions across the United States selects a representative. McCasland served two years as the NTWC representative. A new representative will be selected this year. On the second day of the meeting, RTOC meets with EPA representatives and other agencies to address concerns and highlight successes.

April 17-19, 2024, Delaware Nation Environmental Program staff attended the Tribal Summit. The Summit showcases environmental topics that tribes and pueblos may face such as PFAS pollution, renewable energy, air quality, water quality, pesticides, solid waste, brownfields, superfunds, Underground storage tanks, and Emergency Response.

### Youth Spotlight



#### **GABRIEL SADONGEI**

My name is Gabriel Sadongei, born and raised in Anadarko, OK. For the past year or so, I have been conducting research on animal behavior. Through this research I have gained tools and knowledge for the years to come. I am currently conducting an experiment on our lab population of African cichlid fish. I have been accepted to present this work at the annual meeting of the Animal Behavior Society in London, Ontario, Canada funded by a Charles H. Turner Award. This species (Astatotilapia burtoni) is a model system in neuroscience because of their dramatic socially mediated phenotypic plasticity.

Males change color, size, and fertility status in direct response to neuroendocrine changes following social wins. These wins occur in contests over territory centered on bowers. I designed a choice experiment focused on defensibility (entry size relative to male body size) of these bowers. I am presenting this work at the 2024 Animal Behavior Society meeting. I am also the lab manager for the Social Ethology Lab at Fort Lewis College and vice president of the Psychology Club. My senior research will focus on the development of variation in individual relatedness and quality/experience of interpersonal and intrafamilial relationships. I am hoping to pursue a PhD/PsyD in Clinical Psychology.




#### **EMMA HENSEN**


